

Dear Parishioners and Friends

Sunday Reflections to enhance life.

Jesus said, "If your eyes cause you to sin, tear it out and if your hands and feet cause you to sin, cut them off. It is better to go heaven with one eye, one hand and one leg rather than going to hell without mutilation of limbs of the body". If people were to follow this instruction literally then, majority of people would have self-mutilated their limbs in order to go heaven. Did Jesus mean that way? No, Jesus used metaphorical language to teach us something profound. The question that is worth reflecting today is: Who and what has more influence on my life? What do we mean by eyes, hands and feet that cause so much good or harm to us?

Caring eyes: Our eyes can enjoy the beauty of nature and care for others. We can be easily influenced by a load of information and media. There is useful media content that can really help us for our spiritual, intellectual and psychological development. At the same time, there are other internet content that can mislead and badly infect our mind and heart. One has to be aware of its positive and negative aspect and use it what is profitable for one's own development and eliminate the rest of it.

Helping hands: Our hands are made for creative works and helping others. They can become generous and prayerful hands. Our hands can be a source of comfort, blessing, and build up relationship with a handshake. We can encourage others by giving a pat on their shoulder or giving a round of applause. Helping and praying hands are beautiful! At the same time, it can be used for other negative purposes that profit no one.

Directing feet: Our feet can be used for dance and sports. It can help us go in a right path and direct others to follow the path of freedom, knowledge, wisdom, good works and salvation. It connects us to the earth; it connects to our roots and heritage. It makes us to be messengers of good news. Leaders, teachers and parents can lead their subjects and children in a right way: focusing on spiritual and eternal riches. At the same time, people can mislead others and it can be a blind leading the blind.

Jesus invites us to be aware of what really influence our mind and heart and what affects our life today. We can discern and decide what we really want in life. We can save our eyes, hands and feet from evil influences so that we can be physically, spiritually, emotionally healthy. St. Irenaeus said, "The glory of God is man fully alive."


The Catholics of St Anne's Ormskirk and St Elizabeth's Scarisbrick invite you to find out more about the Catholic faith through the R.C.I.A

St Bede's School

Every week a group of our year 9,10 and 11 pupils meet to discuss current affairs. They reflect on an issue or event and consider how, as young Catholics, scripture and Catholic Social Teaching can help them repond to it. During the week they create and record a prayer resource which is shared with the whole school during form time. Following a meeting with St Anne's Parish Council, we were invited to share with parishioners part of the script from the resource. Over the coming months, we hope these scripts will offer you an insight into what our young people feel about a variety of issues and how valuable Catholic Social Teaching is in helping inform all of our responses to a range of issues. We hope this can become a regular part of the Parish bulletin.

Last week the pupils reflected on the Grenfell Enquiry through the lens of scripture and Catholic Social Teaching. Below is part of the pupils' response.

"In 2017 an inferno swept through London's Grenfell Tower, a block of dangerous flats, killing 72 people. The Grenfell report, which has recently been shared with the public, tells us who is responsible for that fire and for the deaths of the people who lived there. The report has blamed "dishonest" companies who put profit and greed before the safety of people. These companies lied and deliberately set about making people feel the cladding on their flats was safe, when actually they knew very well it was deadly and could kill. It would cost money to replace it. So they didn't.

The report also blames governments who since the early 90s missed "many opportunities" to make these buildings safe and hold greedy companies to account. People in power have a responsibility to speak the truth and protect the needs of people. They didn't.

What we find most shocking is the report states that it was poorer, vulnerable people who suffered because the hugely wealthy landlords of Kensington and Chelsea didn't care about fire safety. They didn't live there, in the dangerous buildings. Their lack of action in making the buildings safe, suggests their blind indifference to those who did live there. These people didn't seem to matter. Their dignity and right to life was not seen or respected.

So, it is right and just that the truth about those responsible is made public. People ignored the needs of others who were vulnerable. Truth and justice are essential. Jesus proclaimed and embodied a society ruled by justice and charity. This is the model we should follow. However......

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......Are we criticising the splinter in our neighbours' eyes whist ignoring the log in our own? As we point the finger of blame, let's think about ourselves and our behaviour towards others.

Do we always see clearly?

Do we sometimes fail to see the needs of others? Do we ignore the needs of others? The responsibility of caring for others and respecting their dignity whether that's in a tower block in London, or the streets and homes of Liverpool and Ormskirk, lies with all of us.

Last week we were introduced to the word "Sawubona" in assembly which is a greeting used in South Africa by the Zulu tribe. It means "I see you." I see your uniqueness, I see your needs, I see your struggles, I see you as my brother or sister, I see your dignity. Imagine if we could see others clearly like that, day in and day out? Perhaps tragedies like Grenfell wouldn't happen.

As young Catholics we understand that scripture and Catholic Social Teaching enable us to see clearly, the wisdom in both enable us to consider situations thoughtfully and act accordingly, recognising we are all made in the image of God and interconnected.

Firstly, Catholic Social Teaching teaches us the importance of rights and responsibilities.

We are created in God's image. As such, every person has the right to life and to those things which preserve their dignity, or quality of life, like safe housing. Corresponding to those rights are responsibilities. Because we are created in the image of God we must respect the rights of others and care for them in the way Jesus shows us.

Scripture states we should "Seek the welfare of the city, for in its welfare you will find your welfare." Jeremiah 29:4-7. To flourish as a community and as individuals, recognising the rights of our neighbours and ensuring we recognise our responsibility in ensuring their dignity is respected, is the only way we can flourish, communally and personally.

Catholic Social Teaching also teaches us the importance of rising to the call of participation. We have a duty to participate, to actively play a part in contributing to the common good. The book of Proverbs leaves us in no doubt about this: "Speak up and judge fairly, defend the rights of the poor and needy." As St Oscar Romero said we must be "God's microphone."Yet what does this look like for us as young people in St Bede's? We may not be in Westminster- yet, but it starts for us on the corridors of our school, in our kitchens at home. Speaking out when we see something unfair or unjust on a corridors, treating people with courtesy and respect in the playground means we are actively respecting the dignity and equality of all people. Being environmentally aware and 'living simply' at home also shows we are recognising the rights and responsibilities of ourselves and others, and the need to be participate actively in working towards the common good.

It seems to us, seeing clearly, looking at our neighbour and saying "Sawubona" is the first step.
